

Federal Government Spending



Uniform Guidance (2 CFR Part 200)

2 C.F.R. § 200.322, Domestic Preferences for Procurements

(a) As appropriate and to the extent consistent with law, the non-Federal entity should, to the greatest extent practicable under a Federal award, provide a preference for the purchase, acquisition, or use of goods, products, or materials produced in the United States (including but not limited to iron, aluminum, steel, cement, and other manufactured products). The requirements of this section must be included in all subawards including all contracts and purchase orders for work or products under this award.

(b) For purposes of this section:

(1) "Produced in the United States" means, for iron and steel products, that all manufacturing processes, from the initial melting stage through the application of coatings, occurred in the United States.

(2) "Manufactured products" means items and construction materials composed in whole or in part of non-ferrous metals such as aluminum; plastics and polymerbased products such as polyvinyl chloride pipe; aggregates such as concrete; glass, including optical fiber; and lumber.



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[Proposed] (c) Federal awarding agencies providing Federal financial assistance for infrastructure projects must comply with the Buy America Preferences set forth in <u>2 CFR part</u> <u>184</u>.

BABA Timeline

Jan 2021: Biden Issues E.O. 14005



Nov 2021: Biden Signs the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA)



Apr 2022: OMB Issues Guidance (OMB M-22-11)



Feb 2023: OMB Issues Proposed Rule (new 2 CFR Part 184)





IIJA, Title IX – Build America, Buy America

- Pub. L. No. 117-58, §§ 70901-70953
- Requires federal *infrastructure programs* to provide for the use of materials "produced in the United States."
 - "Infrastructure" generally, not limited to IIJA-funded Projects.
 - Projects awarded on or after November 10, 2022 (absent waiver)
- Requires Agencies to report to OMB and Congress identifying:
 - Federal programs for infrastructure administered by the Agency
 - Identifying applicable domestic content procurement preferences (potential back-fill)
 - Waivers
- OMB directed to promulgate final rules/guidance to standardize compliance



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IIJA, Title IX – Build America, Buy America

Section 70912

(2) Domestic content procurement preference... means a requirement that no amounts made available through a program for Federal financial assistance may be obligated for a project unless –

(A) all iron and steel [including products made wholly or predominantly of iron or steel] used in the project are produced in the United States;

(B) the manufactured products used in the project are produced in the United States; or

(C) the construction materials used in the project are produced in the United States.



"Produced in the United States"

Iron or Steel

"all manufacturing processes, from the initial melting stage through the application of coatings, occurred in the United States."





"Produced in the United States"

Manufactured Product

(1) Product manufactured in the U.S.; AND
(2) Cost of components from U.S.- sources > 55%





"Produced in the United States"

Construction Materials

"all manufacturing processes for the construction material occurred in the United States"





BABA Waivers

- 1. Inconsistent with public interest
 - Small grants?
 - De minimis cost/content?
 - Adjustment period (partial DOT waivers in place)
- 2. Nonavailability
 - Quantity/quality
- 3. Unreasonable Cost
 - Overall project cost increases by 25%



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BABA Waiver Process



- 1. Recipient issues written request for waiver to federal agency providing the funding (**not** state/local entity receiving the grant).
- 2. Agency notifies the Made in America Office (MIAO) of proposed waiver.
- 3. Agency makes waiver publicly available on Agency's website (15/30 Day Comment Period).
- 4. Waiver cross-posted to MadeInAmerica.gov.
- 5. After comment period, Agency sends proposed waiver to the MIAO.
- 6. MIAO reviews and makes determination as to whether waiver is consistent with law.
- 7. Waiver approved by Agency (in coordination with MIAO).



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BABA Waivers: Contractor Responsibility

- Work with state/local grant recipients to submit waiver requests to the federal agency
- Provide a detailed justification for the waiver, including information regarding:
 - ✓ Waiver type
 - ✓ Recipient name
 - ✓ Federal awarding agency
 - ✓ Federal program name and number
 - ✓ Funding amount
 - ✓ Total cost of infrastructure expenditures
 - Project description
 - List of products proposed to be excepted from the requirements
 - Certification that the recipient has made a good faith effort to solicit bids from domestic suppliers
 - Waiver justification



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BABA: Proposed Rules/Requests for Comment

- Suggests borrowing familiar concepts from the Buy American Act:
 - "Iron and Steel" + "Predominantly from iron or steel"
 - "Cost of components"
 - "End product" + "component"
- Proposes greater granularity for "construction materials" (which must have all manufacturing processes take place in the U.S.):
 - Non-ferrous metals
 - Plastic and polymer-based products
 - Glass

FRACTING

- 🗸 Lumber
- ✓ Drywall
- Clarifies that binding agents, aggregates (stone/sand/gravel), and concrete are not "construction materials" (per § 70917(c)), but questions how they should be treated





- Fiber optic cable
- Optical fiber
- Composite building materials
- Other? (Industry input requested)










BABA vs. Agency Regulations, Generally




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
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BABA vs. FTA "Buy America" Coverage

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

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
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BABA vs. Amtrak "Buy America" Coverage

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Differences Between BAA and BABA

	Buy American Act	Build America, Buy America
Processing Requirements	 "Manufacturing" 	 "Manufacturing" (for manufactured goods) "All manufacturing processes" (for iron & steel + construction materials)
Content/Components	 Steel & Iron – 95% Manufactured Products – 60% 	 Steel & Iron – 100% Manufactured Products – > 55% Construction materials – 100%
COTS/commercial item	 Partial COTS exception relating to "domestic content" requirement is available for <i>some</i> manufactured end- items 	Inapplicable
Types of Contract Deliverables	 Applies to supplies + construction materials (which include iron & steel products) Does not apply to services 	 Applies to iron & steel + manufactured goods + construction materials Does not apply to services
Waivers	 "Unreasonable cost" measured at line- item level 	 "Unreasonable cost" measured at project level

BABA Overview

Build America, Buy America Act

- BABA sets "Buy America" baseline for federal infrastructure projects
 - Agencies may impose additional domestic preference
 - Some agencies (like FTA/FHWA) already impose higher requirements
- Proposed OMB rules should harmonize some of these requirements; comments open through March 13, 2023
- Key risk area for contractors is disconnect/gap between BABA and other agency requirements
